

20 YEARS



FOUNDING IN ST. LUCIA

Programming began in St. Lucia in 2004 with a two-week oncampus program with agriculture students from Ciceron Secondary School followed by the introduction of teacher training in environmental education. The first ever Rainforest to Reef Camp took place in 2007.



EXPANDED TO OTHER COUNTRIES

While our work continued to grow in St Lucia, we also expanded to other countries like Dominica, Curaçao, Belize, Jamaica, Haiti, and the Dominican Republic where we worked on programs and projects such as teacher training and workshops, watershed exploration and protection, student camps, restoration projects, and more.



REPLICATED PROGRAMS IN U.S.

After success in the Caribbean, watershed programs were replicated in the Southeast US beginning with Kids for Clean Water Camp in 2008.







RESTORATION PROJECTS IN THE CARIBBEAN

We constructed a biogas digester at a Mabouya Valley farm and more in the Soufriere Basin to prevent pig waste from contaminating local streams. With support from the Chattanooga Breakfast Rotary, we also installed a constructed wetland for sewage treatment in Aux Leon, St. Lucia. In Dominica, we rehabilitated a public toilet in Mero and installed a wetland treatment system partnering with Conyers, GA and Dominica Rotary Clubs. In Curaçao, we partnered with Sunset Waters Beach Resort and the Lee's Reef Project to build a wetland treatment system for the resort.



THE GEAR CLOSET

The Gear Closet was established in 2012 to support WaterWays and offer affordable outdoor gear, ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to enjoy the outdoors. Additionally, we're proud to divert thousands of pounds of used gear from landfills each year. In the fall of 2023, we relocated to our new location at 305 Signal Mountain Road.







LITTER REDUCTION INITIATIVE

The litter reduction initiative began in 2013 with the first ever Bonnaroo Clean-up. Since then we have expanded our programs to include Adopt-A-WaterWay program (2018), taking over the Tennessee River Rescue (2021), and installing litter booms on Chattanooga Creek (2023) and in St. Lucia (2024).

AT A GLANCE



RAINSMART YARDS

In partnership with the City of Chattanooga and Hamilton County, the RainSmart Yards initiative was founded in 2018. This award program recognizes creek-friendly yards that capture and retain stormwater during rain events, as well as creating habitat for native plants and pollinators.







REBRANDING

CaribbeanSEA and TenneSEA rebranded to WaterWays in 2019 to better reflect our mission.



RESTORATION PROJECTS IN THE U.S.

We partnered with the Raines Group to install a stormwater wetland at their 4 Squares property. We provided educational programs and built rain gardens at Thrasher Elementary and Red Bank High School. Our first streambank restoration project took place at Red Bank Elementary, with subsequent stormwater green infrastructure projects at Red Bank Community Center and at Walden's Ridge Park. Most recently, we repaired failing septic systems and remediated acidic drainage from old coal mines. We have also engaged community members through a series of streambank repair workshops, successfully stabilizing sections of Read Creek's eroded streambank at Walden's Ridge Park.







OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

WaterWays and Enterprise South Nature Park worked in conjunction with Volkswagen Chattanooga to construct an outdoor classroom and education area in Enterprise South Nature Park where we host hundreds of students annually on vital topics such as wetland function, water quality, watershed stewardship, and litter reduction.



WATERWAYS SUSTAINABILITY FUND EST. 2024

To honor the work that has gone before and to sustain the work for the next 20 years and beyond, the WaterWays Board of Directors announced the establishment of an endowment fund, the WaterWays Sustainability Fund, which is housed with the Community Foundation of Greater Chattanooga.













LITTER BOOM INSTALLED IN ST. LUCIA

On World Environment Day, June 5th, WaterWays, Osprey Initiative, and Heineken Saint Lucia Ltd. launched the SEAA project in Castries, aimed at improving the Choc River's water quality through community education and corporate responsibility. Later that month, we celebrated the installation of St. Lucia's first litter boom! To clean out the boom we hired a local contractor who was also trained to audit the captured litter. The boom has gained significant attention by local officials and businesses with a continued adoption of the river by the Satellite Rotary Club. We are leading environmental clubs at schools in the watershed which will lead to the creation of recycling bins for schools and a community program for incentivizing recycling. The project was featured in official discussions about the Returnable Containers Bill. Stay tuned for more litter reduction initiatives in St. Lucia!

CLEANING UP THE SOUFRIERE RIVER

The **Soufriere River basin** bounded by the Pitons in St. Lucia has long been a focus of WaterWays. Originating in the rainforests, it is impacted by agriculture, piggeries, tourism and other development before it reaches the sea. Litter is an increasing problem while the elevated E. coli concentrations have long been an issue. We received a UN grant to begin planning an Adopt -A-**River** pilot program focused on the Soufriere River to facilitate the clean up and long term protection of the river. We developed a Charter for the Management of the Soufriere River and established a committee to oversee its management. In going over our proposed activities, we quickly exceeded the budget for a UN Small grant. The consensus of the stakeholders, including the UN Small Grants Fund, was to keep all project components intact and instead seek additional grants from other sources to fund everything. We have a challenge ahead of us!

RAINFOREST TO REEF CAMP

WaterWays held our annual **Rainforest to Reef Camp** this summer at **Grand Eden Estate**, welcoming eighteen children from various communities in Saint Lucia, many experiencing camping for the first time. Activities included bird watching, treasure hunting, hiking to **Enbas Saut waterfall**, stargazing, and a bonfire with sausages and s'mores. The camp ended with snorkeling at **Anse des Pitons**, where participants saw diverse marine life and the impact of Hurricane Beryl's storm surge, making for a memorable educational experience.



PROJECT MANGROVE - BELIZE

WaterWays' inaugural **Project Mangrove** workshops proved to be a great success. Thanks to **Galen University** and their Environmental Science Department, educators traveled to Galen's campus for lessons on watershed management and how they can help students have a better understanding of their role in the environment. Afterward, educators and students from various parts of the country gathered at the **University of Belize's** remote **Calabash Caye Field Station** to delve into the Ridge to Reef concept, emphasizing the interconnectedness of ecosystems and the pivotal role of mangroves in enhancing climate change resilience.

Situated within the Turneffe Atoll Marine Reserve, approximately 33 nautical miles from Belize City, the field station is surrounded by mangrove islands. Participants had the opportunity to explore the forest trail and outran the mosquitos on the way to the mangrove tower.

Snorkeling on the Marine Reserve's snorkel trail, a segment of Belize's extensive barrier reef system, was definitely a highlight for everyone. In addition, the workshop included an investigation into beach litter, nature-based activities, and the development of a mangrove curriculum. We are eager to see how the inaugural group of teachers and students will apply their newfound knowledge.

Participants provided overwhelmingly positive feedback about the Project Mangrove Workshops, recognizing the crucial role of mangroves in their ecosystems.



This workshop was made possible by our partnerships with Galen University, the University of Belize and Environmental Research Institute (ERI) Calabash Caye Field Station, and the Turneffe Atoll Sustainability Association (TASA). This project and workshop is funded by the CEK Foundation's Earth Focus Initiative.




TRASH FREE TOMORROW

What happens to litter left behind by others? It may make its way to **Chattanooga Creek**, the city's most polluted waterway.

Since the installation of the floating litter boom on Chattanooga Creek in May of 2023, it has successfully intercepted **OVER 5,000 POUNDS** of litter and debris from entering the Tennessee River. Among the items collected we've found tons of plastic bottles, styrofoam, and aluminum cans. The most surprising item? A jetski! Working with additional partners, we plan to install two additional litter booms in the Chattanooga area in the coming months.

This summer, we also expanded our litter reduction initiatives to the Caribbean, where we installed the first litter boom in St. Lucia to combat litter challenges similar to those we face in the U.S.

These achievements wouldn't be possible without the support of our partners: the City of Chattanooga, Hamilton County Water Quality, Wild Trails, Coke Consolidated, Heineken St. Lucia, and Osprey Initiative.





THE TENNESSEE RIVER RESCUE

This October, volunteers across the Tennessee River Valley helped collect over 38,000 pounds of litter during the annual Tennessee River Rescue. In collaboration with our partners at the **Tennessee** RiverLine, WaterWays has broadened its efforts to include communities in Northern Alabama, completing over 45 projects throughout the region. We would also like to thank Osprey Initiative for coordinating our first recycling effort this year. The Tennessee River Rescue plays a vital role in supporting the Tennessee River Watershed, recognized as one of the most biodiverse areas in the world. It exemplifies the collective effort needed from community members, municipalities, and both state and federal organizations to safeguard our shared resource. We hope the increased awareness from this event will bring us closer to achieving our goal

of a Trash Free Tomorrow. We would like to thank

For the past seven years, WaterWays has proudly partnered with the **City of Chattanooga** to bring the **RainSmart Yards** program to life, helping local homeowners transform their landscapes into sustainable, stormwater-smart ecosystems. This year we kicked off our survey season on **World Water Day** with a fun, family-friendly scavenger hunt across Hamilton County's watersheds, offering swag and prizes to participants.

In the spring, we hosted a hands-on rain garden workshop, where homeowners learned how to design and implement rain gardens to manage stormwater runoff. While we didn't hold a RainSmart competition this year, we continued our mission by surveying yards throughout our area and successfully remediating stormwater issues while creating pollinator-friendly habitats. Moreover, we've worked to expand the program to the City of Red Bank which is now offering stormwater fee discounts. RainSmart Yards remain a vital part of improving water quality in our community by reducing stormwater runoff and enhancing local biodiversity.

WILD PLANT RESCUE

2023 was a hard year to follow up for Wild Plant Rescue. Last year we were able to conduct many rescues and participate in two plant sales! This year we found it

difficult to connect with developer contacts willing to let us rescue native plants from their properties. So while this program isn't as busy as it was last year, we are still taking calls and emails to rescue native plants before any type of planned disturbance during the native plant growing season (February-November). CONSERVATION AND CORKS

This year, we launched our first pop-up event, "Conservation and Corks," at Chattanooga's new wine bar, 50/50, celebrating local conservation efforts. The evening included a premium wine tasting by **TheoLeo** Wines, a sustainability market and nature-based trivia, with proceeds supporting WaterWays' initiatives. The successful event united native plant nurseries, ecofriendly vendors, and conservation organizations, raising awareness and funds for environmental projects. It fostered community engagement and connected attendees with conservation professionals. We hope to establish this as an annual tradition to enhance conservation and community involvement.

NATURE BY THE PINT



Our fourth season of **Nature by the Pint** is underway! Since the start of this series, we have worked with multiple breweries to put on once-monthly nature-based talks

ranging from topics like our very first session on Mycoremediation in 2021 (given by our very own Rosy Harpe!), to caves, fish, prescribed fires, wildflowers and so much more! Keep an eye out for our monthly Nature by the Pint series, now through April 2025. A YEAR IN REVIEW

WaterWays worked with nearly **3,000 students** for in-person outdoor education programming in the 2023/2024 school year! Thank you to all that made personal education donations or volunteered your time for field trips. Together, we are helping get kids outside.

AMERICAN WATER GRANT

The American Water Charitable Foundation is a wonderful organization that continues to support the mission of WaterWays. This past school year, we were able to work closely with Brainerd High School students to learn about the South Chickamauga Creek watershed. Students connected to their waterway by conducting abiotic (non-living) water quality tests and biotic (living) index measurements both on their campus and through a field trip to Audubon Acres and paddle trip on North Chickamauga Creek.

CHECK OUT A CREEK-KIT

Need supplies to get your students or family in the creek? Then head to the Chattanooga Public Library (Downtown, 2nd floor)! WaterWays partnered with the Children and Youth services team to offer "Water Exploration Kits" to Chattanooga Public Library patrons. The kits include nets, critter viewers, ID Guides, scavenger hunts, water quality test kits, and lesson plans. This was all made possible through a grant from the American Water Charitable Foundation.

EAST LAKE OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

We are thrilled to announce the completion of the first phase of the **Outdoor Classroom at East Lake Elementary School.** Our heartfelt gratitude goes to our partners at **Wild Rose Homes** and **Lee-Smith, Inc.** for their dedicated efforts in constructing this space. 
COMMUNITY SCIENCE

Education, stewardship, and science are at the core of everything we do. We are proud to combine the three by launching a community science database with **FieldScope**. Our initial projects will include abiotic (non-living) and biotic (living) water quality data collected by our school-based Stream Teams and a trash audit from our community Adopt-A-WaterWay teams. This data can be used as evidence to support green infrastructure, restoration projects, and more.






Discover Life in America (DLiA) has partnered with us to bring the power of outdoor discovery and community science through iNaturalist to our outdoor classroom at the Volkswagen Summit Education Area within Enterprise South Nature Park. This project will create a database of species observations specific to this location. Download the iNaturalist app and keep an eye out for the species we catalog!





RESTORING MOUNTAIN CREEK

Coming soon! Starting in 2025, Mountain Creek will undergo a transformation that has been a decade in the making. With federal funding from the EPA's 319 Grant Program and the American Rescue Plan, WaterWays and the City of **Chattanooga** will initiate large-scale stream restoration and floodplain reconnection projects throughout the Mountain Creek watershed. The project area encompasses properties including the Mountain Creek Church of Christ (shown to the right), Red Bank High School, Red Bank Elementary School, and the Spring Valley and **Quail Hollow** neighborhoods in Red Bank. The Church of Christ project will involve full scale stream restoration utilizing natural channel design methods and rerouting the stream to a functional meander that hopefully enhances local water quality, minimizes land loss due to erosion, and revitalizes local biodiversity.

WHY STREAMBANK REPAIR MATTERS

Stringer's Branch, an impaired stream, has faced significant environmental challenges over the years. Almost entirely channelized by concrete, this stream suffers from erosion, loss of natural habitat, and poor water quality. Streambank repair is crucial for such impaired waterways because it helps to restore the natural flow of water, reduce sedimentation, and improve aquatic habitats. By replanting native species and implementing bioengineering methods like live staking and coir logs, we can address erosional issues and promote long-term health of the stream. This restoration effort will not only stabilize the streambank but also enhance water quality, biodiversity, and flood resilience in the surrounding areas.

TDEC GRANT FOR STRINGERS BRANCH

We are excited to announce that WaterWays has received a substantial grant from the **Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation**(**TDEC**) to fund a collaborative streambank restoration along **Stringers Branch**. This project, beginning this fall, brings together WaterWays, **Baylor School,** and **the City of Red Bank** to restore multiple sections of the creek.

A strong partnership with Baylor is key to WaterWays' mission of educating the community on water resources. **Dr. Ben Holt** and his students will conduct research on reducing invasive species and implementing streambank restoration methods. Their work will generate valuable data for future publications, enhancing understanding of watershed health. This hands-on experience will teach students about watershed management and ecosystem restoration, while also contributing to local watershed restoration and fostering future environmental stewards.

EXPANDING OUR IMPACT

In addition to restoring sections of Stringer's Branch on Baylor's campus, we'll also be repairing areas near our new office space at The Gear Closet.
Furthermore, we've already applied for additional TDEC funding to expand this important work into the Mountain Creek watershed and to continue the streambank restoration at Read's Creek, helping protect even more of our region's water resources.
